



## S\*T\*O\*P Violence Against Women Formula Grants

### State: Oregon (OR)

**Reporting Period** - January 1, 2014 – December 31, 2014

## General Grant Information

- Information for this report was submitted by 52 individual subgrantees for the January 1, 2014 – December 31, 2014 reporting period.
- Three (5.8%) subgrantees were faith-based organizations.
- Nine (17.3%) subgrantees were culturally-specific community-based organizations.
- Ten (19.2%) subgrantees reported using STOP Program funds for projects that specifically addressed tribal populations.
- Dual programs and Domestic violence programs were the types of organizations most frequently using STOP funds. The following is a complete list of the types of funded organizations:

### Victim Services

During the 12-month reporting period, STOP Program subgrantees provided services to 6,425 victims/survivors<sup>2</sup> of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking to help them become and remain safe from violence.

- Program reached capacity
- Program unable to provide service due to limited resources/priority-setting
- Services inappropriate or inadequate for victims/survivors with mental health issues
- Services inappropriate or inadequate for victims/survivors with substance abuse issues
- Services not appropriate for victim/survivor

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Of the 6,425 victims/survivors served during the 12-month reporting period, those who were served or partially served were most likely to be White (68.9%)<sup>4</sup>, Female (91.0%)<sup>5</sup>, and between the ages of 25 and 59 (72.8%)<sup>5</sup>.

### Shelter services

- 1,029 victims/survivors and 683 family members received a total of 36,613 bed nights in emergency shelter.
- 19 victims/survivors and 10 family members received a total of 1,922 bed nights in transitional housing.

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### **Hotline calls**

- 11,531 hotline calls were received from primary victims/survivors.
- A total of 24,819 hotline calls were received.

### **Victim-witness notification/outreach to victims/survivors**

- 1,982 notification/outreach services were provided to victims/survivors.

### **Protection orders**

- Of the protection orders<sup>8</sup> for which victim services staff provided assistance, 1,631 orders were granted for domestic violence/dating violence victims/survivors; 20 orders were granted for sexual assault victims/survivors; and 51 orders were granted for stalking victims/survivors.
