Since 2004, I have been facilitating multi-party processes that encourage diverse stakeholders with varied interests to build consensus and resolve complex, emotionally charged and politically sensitive topics. I am a Senior-Level Public Policy Facilitator for Oregon Consensus. The following are a few examples of processes I have facilitated over the past five years:

- For the City of Portland Comprehensive Plan Update process, I facilitated a 25-member Neighborhood Centers Policy Expert Group. The Neighborhood Centers PEG met 16 times over one and a half years. My tasks included meeting with City staff, preparing meeting agendas and summaries, facilitating the meetings and coordinating PEG member communications.
- For Metro's Transfer System Configuration Project, I facilitated a Task Force of 11 solid waste transfer system owners and operators. The Task Force met 11 times over a 14-month period. My tasks included meeting with Metro staff and solid waste consultants, preparing meeting agendas and summaries, facilitating the meetings and coordinating Task Force member communciations. I also interviewed Task Force members as part of a mid-project evaluation to assess the level of satisfaction with the project and the level of consensus around a solution.

- For the City of Oregon City, I facilitated a 19-member Community Advisory Team to guide the development of a Concept Plan for the South End area of the city. The CAT met seven times over a one year period. My tasks included preparing meeting agendas and summaries and facilitating the meetings.
- For Tillamook County, I facilitated a Steering Committee and a Community Advisory Committee as part of the Cape Kiwanda Master Plan for Tourism-Related Facilities process. The Steering Committee was comprised of 25 representatives from local, county and state agencies and met five times over a one year period. The 16-member CAC met two times over the same period. My tasks included leading calls with County staff to coordinate the process, preparing meeting agendas and summaries, and facilitating the meetings.

For nearly 20 years I have worked with public agencies and nonprofit organizations to design and implement inclusive and transparent public involvement processes as a community organizer, planner and community engagement practitioner. I am the chair of Oregon's Citizen Involvement Advisory Committee, providing a forum for citizens and local governments to access resources and share experiences related to Oregon Statewide Land Use Planning Goal 1: Citizen Involvement. The following is a sample of my work related to public involvement over the past five years:

- For the City of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Metro and the State of Oregon, I helped design and implement a comprehensive public involvement effort to engage local, regional and statewide stakeholders for the Willamette Falls Legacy Project. Activities during the one-year process included developing a public involvement plan and key messages, planning three interactive community events, four intergovernmental summits and a regional celebration. I conducted a wide range of public information activities including developing content for the project website, social media messages, email lists, local newspapers, in-person conversations and online surveys and forums.
- I led a team of consultants to assist the Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission (MERC), an appointed commission of Metro, to conduct a public involvement effort for the First Opportunity Target Area program update. Over the course of one year, we conducted more than 40 interviews with key stakeholders, facilitated three focus groups and facilitated several conversations with MERC and Metro Council representatives.
- I assisted ODOT with a five year public involvement effort for the design and construction of the Sunrise Expressway. Activities included developing a public involvement plan, preparing public information materials (newsletters, fact sheets, FAQs, web content), preparing web content and mailings to inform the public of street closures, designing and staffing two public open houses, and
