The goals of the project are: (1) Each year, 450 survivors will have access to an advocate at the courthouse to receive services that enhance their safety and healing (2) Latinx survivors will have meaningful access to a bilingual/bi-cultural advocate to provide culturally appropriate service to enhance safety (3) Law enforcement will identify 120 survivors each year and to take steps to connect them to an advocate to increase safety. The grant activities will be achieved by hiring a 1.0 FTE LAP Advocate and preserve 1.0 FTE Bilingual/bicultural Lead Legal Advocate position. \$279,678.97</p>

The Court Advocate will assist victims through the protection order process. The Court Advocate will provide crisis intervention, safety planning, inform survivors of their rights, provide emergency transportation (from rural and urban areas of the county), accompany and support survivors in court and at video conference hearings, and provide resources and other supportive services to victims navigating the criminal justice system. In total, this grant will fund 1.01 FTE: 0.9 FTE Court Advocate (bicultural/bilingual in Spanish) and .11 FTE Outreach Supervisor. \$180,000</p>
<p>Center Against Rape and Domestic Violence (CARDV)</p>	<p>Benton, Linn</p>	<p>Heidi Henry Interim Executive Director Corvallis, OR 97339</p>	<p>Funds for this project will retain two Crisis Response Advocates (.75 FTE each) and add an additional Advocate (.50 FTE) to provide support for domestic violence survivors in Linn and Benton Counties. The target population for this project is survivors of domestic violence in Linn and Benton Counties with a specific focus on Spanish speaking survivors accessing support group. The Advocates will be the primary staff members on the second crisis and support line during peak hours. To ensure all victims have meaningful access to services offered through this project, Advocates will tailor services for each survivor instead of following a "one service is best for all." To meet the needs of Spanish speaking domestic violence survivors, this project will allow CARDV to offer a Spanish language support group. The group will be offered once a week and clients will be referred to it through advocates and community partners. \$312,428.47</p>

The project will primarily benefit victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking with an emphasis on these underserved communities: Native American (specifically the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs), Latinx, LGBTQ, and teens/young adults. Services will be provided bilingually/biculturally for Spanish speaking clients. The overall goals of the project are to 1) increase safety and access to resources that promote healing from violence, 2) enhance the capacity of HAVEN to provide a coordinated, trauma-informed response to domestic and sexual violence, and 3) decrease staff burnout by eliminating the needs for current advocates to respond to crisis calls during and after business hours, in addition to managing their growing caseloads. Major activities will include staff and volunteer recruitment and training, crisis counseling, and service coordination with other service delivery systems. \$346,773.00</p>
<p>Impact Northwest</p>	<p>Multnomah</p>	<p>Julie Houston Director, Early Childhood Portland, OR 97206</p>	<p>Through this funded project, Impact NW will enhance their established Parent Child Therapeutic Services (PCTS), by reaching 36 additional families (108 individuals: 36 safe parents, and an estimated 72 children) recovering from DV, with culturally-responsive, trauma-informed direct service. Funds will cover 1.2 FTE of direct service interventions. This project will also fund .075 of Clinical Supervisor. Impact NW's Parent Child Therapeutic Services (PCTS) aims to increase the safety and stability of survivors and their children, ages 0-12, and help them heal from the trauma of domestic violence (DV). PCTS employs Master's level Parent-Child Specialists to provide evidence-based interventions utilizing the Child Parent Psychotherapy Model. This model focuses on the quality of parent-child interactions including parenting support, goals setting, safety assessment and planning, information on the impact of DV on children, strengths-based assessment of children's needs, and the creation of tailored and family-centered plans that aim to increase protective factors and create safe, stable, and nurturing homes. \$299,890.00</p>

Advocates will also provide a range of advocacy services to shelter residents, as well as resolve facility problems. Shelter residents with vulnerabilities such as mental health concerns and substance abuse issues will thus be provided additional support over the weekend period, which has historically proven to be a difficult time for shelter residents to be without an on-site Advocate. Additionally, this project will fund these advocates to provide sexual assault hospital response calls in Deschutes County hospitals as needed. They will also staff Saving Grace's Lethality Assessment Program (LAP) line, providing immediate support and shelter to high-danger IPV survivors referred through local law enforcement. Two Advocates at .86 FTE and one Advocate at .63 FTE will be hired, with .09 FTE of supervision from the current Shelter Manager. \$348,237.96</p>

This project will fund in Year 1 a .5FTE Counselor and .05FTE Executive Director, who will provide supervision for the Counselor and assist in developing expanded group services. Year 2 and 3 will increase funding of the Counselor to 1 FTE and fund a 1 FTE Advocate as well as continue to fund the Executive Director at .05FTE. This project will be focused on offering group and individual counseling services to survivors. Groups will include TREM, A Window Between Worlds, and a DV psychoeducational group. These services are all designed to increase the resiliency and self-efficacy in survivors. The advocate will also provide advocacy services to survivors which include crisis intervention, system navigation, healthcare advocacy, accompaniment, protection order assistance and information and referrals. \$322,975.70</p>

The project will address the need for clinical expertise in regards to mental health and substance abuse throughout the YWCA's Domestic Violence Program working with those survivors whose mental health or substance abuse is inhibiting their ability to successfully receive community based DV services. This project will fund a .5 FTE Peer Support Specialist, 1 FTE LCSW, and contract to provide Parent Child Therapeutic Services (PCTS) through Impact NW. The major activities include: PCTS group and family sessions; direct peer mentor services, individual and group therapy to DV survivors, and training of mental health professionals in how to better meet the unique needs of DV survivors. \$504,024.80</p>

Funding will be used to increase their part-time medical provider, contracted through Samaritan Health Services, from .4 FTE to .6 FTE and adding one more full day and will add a third medical provider (1 FTE) to their team. VOCA funds have supported our medical services in the past; however, this expansion is a new project and neither position has been VOCA funded previously. This increase in staffing would more than double ABC House’s capacity to provide on-site medical exams, particularly for cases of children with suspicious physical injury. \$300,000.00
Bay Area Health District dba Bay Area Hospital	Coos	Ashley Matsui Director Coos Bay, OR 97420	With their goal to strengthen the current clinical infrastructure to expand services to the vulnerable and underserved children of Coos County, these funds will allow Bay Area Hospital to add 1.0 FTE Family Support Coordinator/Forensic Interview for 3 years. This new position will allow the Center to not only provide more victim services through advocacy and referrals, but to also cross train an employee who could then assume forensic interviewing capabilities upon retirement of the current interviewer thus eliminating any gaps in services for child victims and families. Additionally, funds will support a .75FTE Forensic Interviewer position for 1 year as a continuation of funds for the current senior forensic interviewer. As the Kids' HOPE Center continues to see a rise in child abuse cases throughout the county, the needs of children and families have become more specific and diverse. Thus, having more than one forensic interviewer on staff allows the Kids' HOPE Center to provide regular continuous services without gaps or delays in scheduling. \$289,245.60

(this is a continuation from their VOCA-C-2016 award). Douglas County will hire a 1.0 FTE Program Supervisor to assist in recruiting, screening, training, case monitoring, and supervising CASA volunteers and their child cases, thus providing increased capacity for services. Jackson/Josephine’s 3-year goals are to recruit, train, supervise 135 new CASA volunteers who will advocate for 345 new children. Douglas/Curry’s goal is to train 50/55 CASAs volunteers and serve 165/245 new children. \$300,000.00

A trained CASA can be transformational in improving the lives of youth in foster care, so CASA for Children will use this proven approach and expand their services to focus on the additional risks facing teens (ages 12-18) and any younger siblings on the same case. They will hire three Teen Specialists (2.5 FTE) who will work with their existing Training & Recruitment team (.15 FTE to be funded) to develop in-depth training for CASA volunteers serving teen cases. These newly trained CASAs, with extra skills and knowledge to combat risk factors, will be better equipped to help their teens transition to adulthood successfully.</p> <p>\$332,439.90</p>

Combined, the agencies will add 1.25 FTE. Major activities will include expanded wrap-around victim services, advocate recruitment, training and case management. CASA of Lane County will serve as project lead. While it has grown more than 55% since 2011, the agency has not kept pace with the rise of children in care and currently serves just 30% of the need. The priority – more CASA volunteers to serve more kids – will be achieved by recruiting larger, more diverse numbers and increasing training and supervision.</p> <p>To better coordinate services to child victims, CASA of Central Oregon has been asked to participate in Family Drug Court and Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) proceedings but lacks staff capacity to do so. This project will add .75 FTE to allow participation and to support an anticipated increase in CASA advocates.</p> <p>\$253,274.00</p>

This project will dramatically increase the availability and delivery of qualified mental health services to children healing from abuse by sustaining and increasing their mental health team. Target population is child victims (ages 3-18 years) and non-offending caregivers impacted by child abuse referred to KIDS Center and the major activities are increased on-site and follow-up services for child abuse evaluation clients and families, increased long-term therapy at KIDS Center and in the rural communities of Crook and Jefferson Counties, and increased education and outreach to community partners. Funds will be allocated to sustaining current personnel (1.2 FTE) and hiring, training, and employing two additional full-time therapists. \$492,570.33</p>

The volunteer coordinator will work 50% time recruiting and training and 50% time supervising CASA volunteers. The volunteer coordinator will be able, per National CASA standards, to supervise up to 15 CASA volunteers at any one time. CASA of Coos County currently serves 145 of the 234 children in foster care in Coos County. This award will aide CASA of Coos County in serving more children and moving closer to serving all children who need a CASA in Coos County. \$155,940.19</p>

The goal of the project is for sexual violence survivors to gain safety, stability and empowerment through dedicated sexual assault services and advocacy. The 1.0 FTE Support Group Coordinator will focus on offering a continuation of two concurrent sexual assault support groups at a rotation of 4 times per year to sexual violence survivors including the following formats; TREM/Trauma Recovery Empowerment Model, ASSA/Adults Survivors of Sexual Assault, and a Creative Healing Arts groups. The Support Group Facilitator, who has remained consistent since the inception of this project in 2016, offers pre and post follow-up advocacy to support group participants. The Support Group Coordinator also offers in-person medical advocacy to survivors as part of Call to Safety's confidential advocacy sexual assault services.</p> <p>\$181,975.51</p>

The project will enhance the services already provided by CHS and expand the continuum of care for victims of human trafficking in our community. Major activities will include: on-scene crisis intervention response by Safety Compass staff (a culturally specific program for victims of HT) in rural and urban Marion County; coordination of intensive case management services between Safety Compass staff and the HT Services Advocates at CHS; culturally appropriate services in CHS Advocacy Office and Shelter; assistance with navigating the criminal justice system; coordinated outreach to the community to raise awareness and build a resource base for survivors; and training for community partners (system and non-system based agencies) that come in contact with victims of human trafficking. In total, there will be 2.08 FTE through this grant: Safety Compass will provide a 1.0 FTE Human Trafficking Advanced Advocate CHS will provide two part-time Human Trafficking Advocates (one bicultural/bilingual in Spanish) and .17 FTE for supervision.</p> <p>\$354,000.00</p>

Our clients are immigrants or refugees from one of 15 nations that made up the Soviet Union. To engage further with Portland’s Russian-speaking community, this project will enable ROSS to hire two full-time case managers; one of which will begin providing .35 FTE case management while spending the remaining .65 FTE in outreach informing the community about how to recognize and support SA victims. As more individuals find they require support, that this staff person will shift from outreach to full case management after 18 months of outreach. When the benchmark of requiring 2 FTE to address the caseload is met, a .50 FTE will be hired to specifically target the 16–20 year old community with materials on recognizing and addressing sexual assault. \$451,667.32</p>

Partnering with advocates and social service providers, their 1 FTE Resource Specialist is dedicated to time-consuming and specialized tasks that they may not be able or have time to pursue, such as accessing trauma-informed counseling, navigating medical insurance bureaucracy and Crime Victims Comp, and securing Title IX accommodations. The SANE Program Manager (.1 FTE) will facilitate acute-care patients’ connection to the Resource Specialist. SART services will be available to all sexual assault survivors (15 and up) in Jackson County. \$292,203.67</p>
<p>Sexual Assault Resource Center</p>	<p>Washington</p>	<p>Amy Beard Executive Director Beaverton, OR 97005</p>	<p>Funds will be used to ensure the maintenance of Sexual Assault Resource Center’s core trauma-informed mental health program, known as The Alder Program. In the Alder Program, clinical mental health services in English and Spanish are offered to people who have experienced sexual violence. The Alder Program will be supported in part through this grant and in part through other funding. Services currently offered, and which we will continue to offer with this funding, are English- and Spanish-language individual therapy and long-term non-time-limited therapeutic support groups. The goal of this project, and the Alder Program as a whole, is to ensure that the agency’s clinical services are provided in English and Spanish, are culturally relevant, are responsive to the unique needs of those who have experienced the trauma of sexual assault, and are sufficient to meet the increased demand for our clinical services. This grant will support three licensed social workers in the Alder Program at 1.0, .75, and .5 FTE. Outside funding supporting the Alder Program will support two additional licensed social workers at .38 FTE each to facilitate additional support groups. \$449,301.39</p>

VOCA funds will support an attorney at 1.0 FTE for 3 years. This position will continue to represent UO students who are survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence in legal matters and student conduct code proceedings that are related to their victimization, and often essential to their immediate health and safety. This will also be provided for students on 6 other campuses of higher education in Lane County. If there is excess capacity, this position will represent low-income survivors in the non-university community ("community clients") on issues related to their health and safety. During year 1 of the grant, VOCA funds will also support a post-grad fellow at .45 FTE, i.e., another attorney who is a recent UO law graduate. The post-graduate fellow will provide free legal services to low-income sexual assault and domestic violence survivors in the community. UO estimates that the funded attorney and the post-grad fellow will divide their time equally between survivors who present with a primary victimization of sexual assault or domestic violence. Major activities include: 1) free, holistic legal services to adult and minor SA survivors in the tri-county; 2) limited legal services to SA survivors statewide; 3) a pro bono legal project to increase our capacity; 4) statewide privacy trainings; and 5) individualized privacy consultations to frontier providers. The project goal is to increase sexual assault (SA) survivors' privacy and access to legal services. Survivors need help with their basic needs: privacy, safety, education, immigration, housing, employment, and financial stability. Victim Rights Law Center is Oregon's only legal organization dedicated to serving SA, and our lawyers are at capacity. This advocate will work in the Victims' Assistance Program at the District Attorney's Office. The advocate will serve victims of crimes committed by youth offenders with the exception of sex crimes. The advocate will serve all persons listed as victims in cases referred to the Jackson County Juvenile Department. This position will assist individual crime victims in understanding the juvenile justice process and their rights as crime victims. The advocate will notify people of hearings, escort them to hearings, refer them the community resources and order restitution for them. The Jackson County District Attorney's Office does not have sufficient resources to fund a dedicated juvenile advocate without these monies. Victims of youth offenders would not receive timely or necessary information regarding the case, their rights, or restitution without this advocate. To address these needs the main project activities are to maintain the 1.0 FTE Bilingual Crime Victims' Advocate and the 0.20 FTE Restitution Advocate that will provide victim rights, services, restitution submission, and emergency crisis response as part of the Emergency Victim Advocate Response Program to the target population of English and/or Spanish speaking victims of adult and juvenile property crimes, vehicular crimes, violent crimes and crime related emergencies in Jefferson County. Victim advocacy services will also be enhanced by the activity of the Emergency Victim Advocate Response Program expanding the use of emergency financial assistance to include all crime victims in crime related emergency situations.
