What is a Bias/Hate Crime?

Under Oregon law, the legal name for a hate crime is a *bias crime*, which is crime motivated by bias against another person's race, color, disability, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, or gender identity^[1]

What is a Bias Incident?

A bias incident is any hostile expression that may be motivated by another person's race, color, disability, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The act does not need to be a crime^[1]

Oregon DOJ's Bias Response Hotline

The hotline was created in 2020 to provide support, resources, information and funds to survivors of bias incidents/crimes^[2]





Reports in Oregon

1,683

There were 1,003 bias incidents and 471 bias crimes reported to the Oregon DOJ Bias Response Hotline in 2021^[4] In the same year, 300 additional bias crimes were reported to law enforcement.^[4] In 2019, a survey estimated 1,265,440 bias crimes and incidents prompting the introduction of the Hotline^[5]
