BIDEN FUNDING ACTIONS TO DATE

"Today, we're taking steps to confront not just the gun crisis, but what is actually a public health crisis" - President Joe Biden, April 12, 2021

- Committed \$5 Billion In His American Jobs Plan
- Adjusted Eligibility for 26 Existing Funds To Address Violence (\$10+ Billion)
- Proposed \$210 Million Dedicated To These Efforts In His FY2022 Budget
- Department of Treasury and Department of Education Provided Guidance
 That American Rescue Plan Funds Should Prioritize Violence Prevention
- Launched CVI Collaborative To Fund 16 Cities Through Philanthropies

Federal Action on CVI

- Launched Office of Gun Violence Prevention in 2023
- CVIPI \$100M annually
- Earmarks






The rate of gun deaths has increased 37% from 2012 to 2021 in Oregon, compared to a 39% increase nationwide. This means that in 2021 there were 227 more gun deaths than in 2012.

In Oregon, the rate of gun suicide increased 22% and gun homicide increased 135% from 2012 to 2021, compared to a 19% increase and 73% increase nationwide, respectively.

Oregon Snapshot - 2021 CDC Data

204 homicides (146 with a gun - 71%)

- Portland 90 homicides (44%)
 - *2022 record high
- Gresham 11 homicides (5%)
- Salem 9 homicides (4%)
- Medford 6 homicides (3%)
- Hillsboro 6 homicides
- Eugene 2 homicides (1%)



Oregon CVI

- 2022: with HB 5202, the Oregon Legislature designated \$15 million to support CVI.
- These funds were made available through use of the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds.
- Oregon Department of Justice, Crime Victim and Survivor Services Division is administering these funds.









- Portland recorded 73 homicides in 2023 22 fewer than the record 95 homicides in 2022
- It also saw a 16% decrease in non-fatal shootings
- And there was a 22% drop in overall shootings, recording 289 fewer shootings in 2023 compared to 2022
