





Firearm Suicide is a Problem in Louisiana



Firearm suicide rate for LA

Veterans is > 2x higher than
the general population

We are not the first (or only) ones in this space:

- Gun Shop Project (Means Matter & NH Firearm Safety Coalition)
- State Storage Maps (firearm retailers & law enforcement)
 - Live Today, Put It Away (Wisconsin)
 - Gun Storage Map (Colorado Firearm Safety Coalition)
 - Washington (State) Firearm Storage Map
- Pause to Protect (U of Colorado & DSPO)
 - Pierce's Pledge (non-profit with related mission)
- Hold My Guns (2A non-profit, proprietary process)



TAP Pilot 2019-2022

- Based on feedback, we decided to take a participatory action research approach
- Partnered with 3 firearm retailers (FFLs) to create a process

 Developed a Toolkit to host all the relevant SOPs, templates, and FAQs

Obviously, a gun store is not traditionally thought of as a place where you go to talk about mental health. But you have this brochure in front of you, and that opens [things] up ... we've had multiple conversations that are beneficial for all.

2022 Legislation addressed retailers' concerns about potential liability

- Bi-partisan legislation HB260 (la.gov)
- Veterans and retailer testified in support
- Passed unanimously in LA State House and Senate, signed by Governor Aug 2022
- First legislation to define FFL (Federal Firearm Licensee) and temporary hold

Key language

"Firearm hold agreement"--private transaction between a FFL and an individual firearm owner where the licensee takes physical possession of the owner's lawfully possessed firearm at the owner's request, holds the firearm for an agreed period of time, and returns the firearm to the owner according to the terms of the transaction.

Immunity from civil liability

(except in case of unlawful conduct by FFL)

TAP Expansion and Sustainment 2023-Present:

- Expanding TAP
 - Identify FFLs in local catchment area
 - Cold calls & in person visits to build relationships
 - Onboard FFLs by training them in suicide prevention and providing resources.
 - Nurture the ongoing relationship through monthly check-ins
- Spreading the Word = Sharing TAP as a Resource with VA and Community Coalitions
 - Inform other community partners about TAP so the services can be used by those in need






We Recruited 12 New FFLs + 1 Base



Time and Effort to Recruit FFLs






- Average Time: 100 minutes
- Average # of Contacts: 2.75
- Primary reason for refusing: storing firearms was outside the scope of their business OR failure to respond to outreach


- 10 Typical Gun Shops






Firearm Suicide is a Problem in Arkansas




■ Suicide ■ Homicide ■ Other

Firearm suicide rate for AR



We Recruited Three FFLs



Time and Effort to Recruit FFLs



- Average Time: 66 minutes
- Average # of Contacts: 2.6
- Primary reason for refusing: civil liability

Our FFLs:

- Typical Gun Shop
- Combination Pharmacy/Gun Shop
- Home-based FFL





We Worked Through Specific Concerns

Challenges

- Questions about types of firearm holds and compliance with local and federal laws
- Civil liability

Solutions

- Met with local AR ATF field officers and brought answers back to FFLs
- Invited LA FFLs to an AR Community of Practice meeting
- Connected AR FFLs, local legislators, and AFSP to continue a conversation about legislation

Preparing for the Pilot

Material Review

• Edits to temporary storage template, marketing materials, and training

Addressing Major Concerns

• Connected FFLs with others to address legislation


Community of Practice Calls

• Set-up monthly call with all FFLs

- 60-90 Minutes
- Pre-Post Evaluation

Pilot Results



AR FFLs were extremely passionate and proactive

- American Legion events
- Tabled at community event
- Contacted local faith communities
- Contacted local military base







Remained the same across states

- Outreach process
- Training
- Temporary storage agreement template
- Evaluation process

Needed to be adapted for Arkansas

- Type of FFL
- Marketing materials
- Connecting different groups regarding legislation
- Working with local ATF

2024/2025 Legislation passed in Arkansas

- 16 FFLs (out of 19) said 'no' when approached; 1 expressed interest in helping pass legislation similar to Louisiana law
- American Foundation for Suicide Prevention Area Director, Jacqueline Sharp, took the lead
- Identified legislators willing to sponsor a bill
- TAP team provided scientific expertise and technical assistance
- FFLs and individuals impacted by firearm suicide testified

HB1067 Bill Information - Arkansas State Legislature

Signed into law as AR ACT 106 effective 2.18.2025







- How do you pass legislation to remove barriers to participation and support initiatives?


