Originally called National Welcoming Week in the U.S., intending to celebrate and uplift diversity and values of welcoming and inclusion for all, today Welcoming Week is a global movement toward a more welcoming world.

But I know it's difficult for many to celebrate this year given our current federal landscape: sharp division in our communities, threats and bullying from government, the rule of law under duress, political violence, an all-out rejection of science and medicine, silencing of the intellectual professional class, censorship of those who speak out, the detainment and deportation of long-time friends and neighbors behind the cowardice of masks and secrecy—all clear signs of our nation's continued march toward authoritarianism.

It feels hopeless at times. I feel hopeless at times. And yet.

And yet we must reject hopelessness now more than ever.

And yet we fight dis- and misinformation by being **informed.** Request an information session for your community on Oregon's <u>bias response</u> and <u>sanctuary promise</u> laws and hotlines. When we are educated about what our laws say, what resources are available, and how we can contribute to our community's overall vibrancy and wellness, this is an act of love. This is a contribution toward welcoming and belonging.

And yet we battle silencing by **participating**. This means speaking up, speaking out, speaking loudly. To report the impact of federal decisions on your life and your community, contact:

- the Governor
- the Oregon Attorney General
- your state/local elected officials
- your federal elected officials

And yet we can reject the othering that happens all too easily online. If you want to see the worst of society, go on social media. Alternative: live in real life!

And yet we avoid polarization and radicalization as we seek out ways to **connect.** Call a neighbor. Share a meal. Ask questions with curiosity. Be vulnerable. Be willing to change and learn.

My message to you: take peaceful, loving steps to reclaim this country. We, the community, are America's soul, its hope, its indominable future.

The Oregon Criminal Justice Commission has created a <u>public</u>, <u>interactive data</u> <u>dashboard for sanctuary promise data in Oregon</u>. This dashboard includes:

- data from public bodies and law enforcement agencies reporting communications and attempts from federal immigration agencies to obtain access/assistance/ cooperation with federal immigration enforcement.
- data from ODOJ's Sanctuary Promise Hotline reflecting community members reports of suspected sanctuary law violations.

A Six-Strategy Framework Examining How Political and Cultural Leaders Weaponize Gender in Ways that Advance Authoritarianism - Othering & Belonging Institute has launched a new project that explores how authoritarian movements leverage and weaponize gender to divide society and opposition movements, launder and normalize social hierarchies, reshape cultural norms, and lay the groundwork for authoritarian power consolidation and violence.

Prosper Portland has launched the <u>Local Small Business Expanded Repair/Restore Grant Program</u>, which provides funding to small businesses located in the City of Portland that have sustained physical and economic damage due to break-ins and vandalism.

Unite Oregon and OHA have introduced a <u>Telenovela Series: Decisions on Sexual and Reproduction Health Choices</u> to inform the Latinx community about the stigma surrounding sexual and reproductive health choices.

WHAT IS THE CRU WATCHING AND READING?

Defectors: The Rise of the Latino Far Right and What it Means for America by Paola Ramos is an NPR Best Book of 2024. Explore through individual storytelling the radicalization, rise, and influence of far-right sentiment among Latinos.

Honky by Dalton Conley, tells Conley's story of his childhood with the hindsight and understanding that comes with his current profession as a sociologist. As one of the only white boys in a mostly Black and Puerto Rican neighborhood on Manhattan's Lower East Side in the 1970s, Conley's memoir reflects on race, class, and inequality in America.

Hombrecito by Santiago Jose Sanchez, is a coming-of-age novel centering a young, queer, immigrant and his complex relationships with identity, family, and his country.

Why Didn't You Tell Me? by Carmen Rita Wong is the story of an immigrant mother's long-held secrets and their impact on her daughter's understanding of her family, her identity, and her place.

Tias and Primas: On Knowing and Loving the Women Who Raise Us by Prisca Dorcas Mojica Rodriguez explores intergenerational trauma, colonization, and sexism in a discussion of archetypes within her family's resilient, beautiful women.

Sugarcane - This documentary is directed by award winners from the Sundance Film Festival Julian Brave NoiseCat and Emily Kassie. "In 2021, evidence of unmarked graves was discovered on the grounds of an Indian residential school run by the Catholic Church in Canada. After years of silence, the forced separation, assimilation and abuse many children experienced at these segregated boarding schools was brought to light, sparking a national outcry against a system designed to destroy Indigenous communities." Their investigation leads watchers into the traumatic history of the Canadian Indian residential school system.
