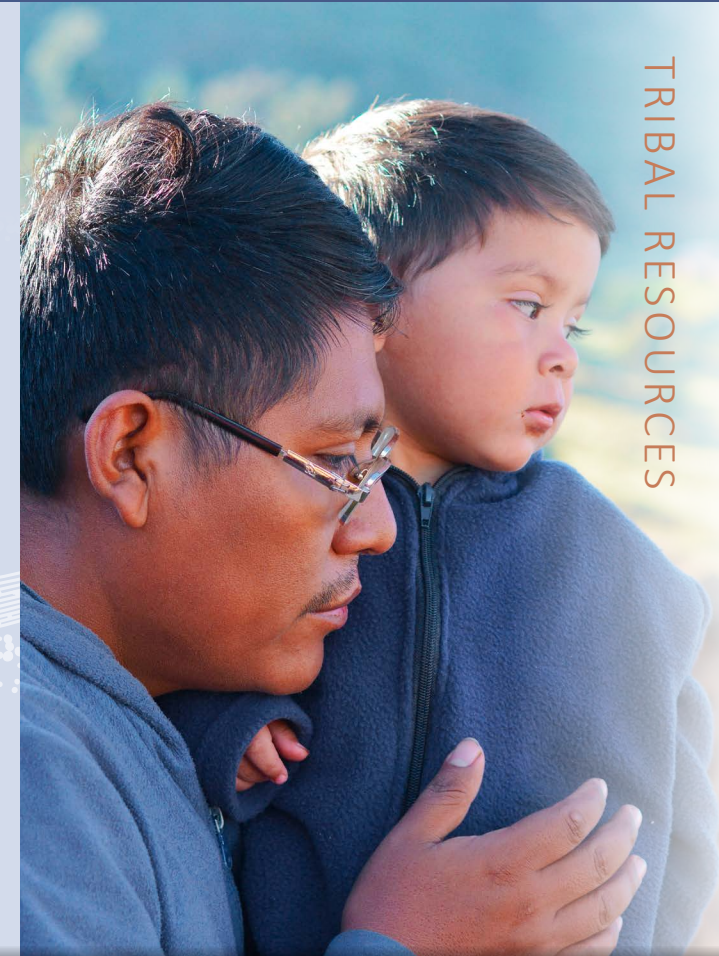

Tribal Families and Child Support Services

There are nine federally recognized American Indian Tribes in Oregon. The Oregon Child Support Program works with Oregon's Native American Tribes to enhance child support services for Tribal families. Each of the nine Tribes is an independent sovereign government with status similar to foreign nations.

If a parent is an enrolled Tribal member of any tribe, we want to ensure our records reflect that—please let us know if either parent is an enrolled Tribal member. This helps us determine if we can provide services or if the Tribe will provide services.

We can help by:

- » Reaching out to Tribal courts, child support, and assistance programs, and other states' child support programs
- » Locating absent parents
- » Establishing paternity (legal fatherhood)
- » Establishing, modifying, and collecting support orders
